

The idea of creating a "Legacy Wall" was birthed shortly after the 2017 Reunion. An illuminated stainless steel representation was established and installed in the stairwell between the second and third floor of the Capps Archives and Museum.

cont'd from Page 1 - Legacy Wall With the help of board members who volunteered many hours of dedicated service, we were able to achieve placement of a sleek modern design that adorns the premises of the Museum, honoring those indivuals who so graciously donated either as a gift or as a memorial. Special thanks go to Frieda Quon, Jeannie Dunn, and Jean Maskas for their contributions in the success of this project.

The largest task in creating our "Donor Wall" was gathering the data. It was an enormous task in researching and attaining the proper figures that each individual had donated. The largest hurdle we encountered was attaining records of donations from the Museum's inception, as many of the donations were presented to Delta State University before the Museum became a tax exempt entity.

As you recall, in the "Donor Forms" that you filled out, we had five categories of "Giving": PEARL, IVORY, JADE, SILVER and GOLD MOUNTAIN. Representation would be cumulative with regards to timely giving, and this allows individuals to climb the "Donor Ladder", so you can be Pearl at the end of one year but progress to Ivory or above with subsequent years of giving.

Within the planning stage, there was a change in the Wall's categories, as two additional designations were incorporated. Because there was such a wide gap between Jade and Silver (from \$1000 to \$5000) the category of BRONZE \$2,500 was created. Also, after all the monetary data was accumulated, it was noted that some individuals had give over \$20,000, so the category of DIAMOND \$20,000 was also created, thus seven categories of giving would be

Gilroy Chow welcomed members and friends to the Opening Reception at the Capps Archives. It was a fun reunion time and place where folks with ties to the Mississippi Delta Chinese could reconnect, and attendees came from Mississippi, Tennessee and Arkansas and even from Texas, California, Virginia and Washington.

Emily Jones, Curator of the Chinese Museum and DSU Archivist revealed her masterpiece Space Themed installation in the Museum Gallery - highlighting Delta Chinese involved with NASA and the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) Program. A special part of the exhibit was a Space Time Line showing exactly what our Delta Chinese were doing at their respective jobs during the Space era. Further enhancing the exhibit were personal space memorabilia from the participants.

Monday morning "A Delta Reunion" resumed in the meeting room of the Young-Mauldin Cafeteria. DSU President William LaForge and City of Cleveland Mayor gave welcome remarks. Harry Gong presented a virtual dedication of the Legacy Wall honoring contributors to The Chinese Museum. The sleek Lucite design is located in the stairwell between second and third floor of the Archives.

Apollo: 50 Years Later - A five member panel featuring Mississippi Delta Chinese men and women with the NASA Space Program and STEM shared their individual experiences relative to their contributions to the Space program.

Peter Joe - Moderator - Boyle/Anaheim, CA – Rocket Engineer – With Rockwell International for 35 years, working on the Intercontinental Ballistic Module and satellite hardening programs.

Gilroy Chow – Cleveland/Clarksdale, MS - Lunar Module Engineer - With Grumman Aircraft Engineering Corporation as a contractor for NASA on lunar modules from 1966 through 1973. Chow was on the team of engineers who figured out to retrofit a CO2 filter to filter out deadly gas in the Apollo13 module.

Josephine Jue- Vance/Houston, TX – Software Development – Joined Johnson Space Center in Texas in 1963 working with NASA for 40 plus years holding three different Chief positions from software development to information systems.

Martin Jue –Hollandale/Starkville, MS – Founded MFJ Enterprises, Inc. - Majority stakeholder in Amateur Radio Market - the world's largest manufacturer of HAM radio accessories.

William Moon – Cleveland/Houston, TX – NASA Mission Control – Started at McDonnell Aircraft Corporation before joining NASA at the Lyndon B. Johnson Space Center, Houston Texas in 1965. He was part of the Apollo Program as a Flight Controller in Mission Control for more than 35 years.

A closing Reception was held at the Martin & Sue King Railroad Heritage Museum. The presentations were well received and portrayed the valuable contributions these Delta Chinese individuals made towards our country's Space program.

There are 93 representations of Donors indiciated at their levels of giving. Thanks to Jeannie Dunn's efforts in tracking donations for 2019, we can inform you that over \$27,000 have been received for the 2019 year.
